Dear Mr. Crim,

I am writing about the County's proposed changes to the RPP program. We did not get the announcement in time to discuss this at our October meeting, and many of our residents were not aware of the forum that was held soon thereafter nor the October 28 deadline for providing feedback to the County.

We discussed it our November meeting last week, and many participants felt that they were left with many unanswered questions and concerns about the impact of the proposed changes on parking within Aurora Highlands. **Members at the meeting voiced unanimous opposition to the RPP changes as proposed without further clarification and discussion with the community.**

As you know, the RPP was born out of concerns regarding the impact of Crystal City commuter parking on our streets. The RPP has served us well in this regard over the decades. With commercial buildings filling up, along with many new residential units and retail establishments, we are again concerned about how the changes will affect our residential parking.

Aurora Highlands has many small rental properties. Some are multi-unit apartment buildings, but many others are multi-tenant single-family houses, i.e. "group houses." Some landlords of these properties have told us that the reduced availability of parking passes may limit their ability to rent these homes or force them to put in driveways to accommodate parking; the community is therefore concerned about adding more imperious surface, possibly at the expense of mature trees.

The biggest concern raised was about enforcement, and the likelihood that parkers will overstay their limit. A two-hour restriction is only good if it is frequently enforced. As confirmed by RPP staff at the Q&A session, "decisions about enforcement are based on police resources and their ability to send out staff for parking enforcement." Is allocating many more police hours to patrolling for parking violators an efficient use of budget or police staff time? Will revenue generated pay for the constant enforcement necessary near areas with high numbers of commuters and retail users?

We had been led to believe, from the last meeting about RPP in the neighborhood, that there would be further engagement before a final plan was rolled out. Although we understand that the Covid pandemic has hampered public engagement, we request an opportunity for a virtual meeting with staff and the community to answer outstanding questions and clarify impacts specific to this area. We don't want to see a return to the conditions in our neighborhood that prompted the creation of the RPP program to begin with.
